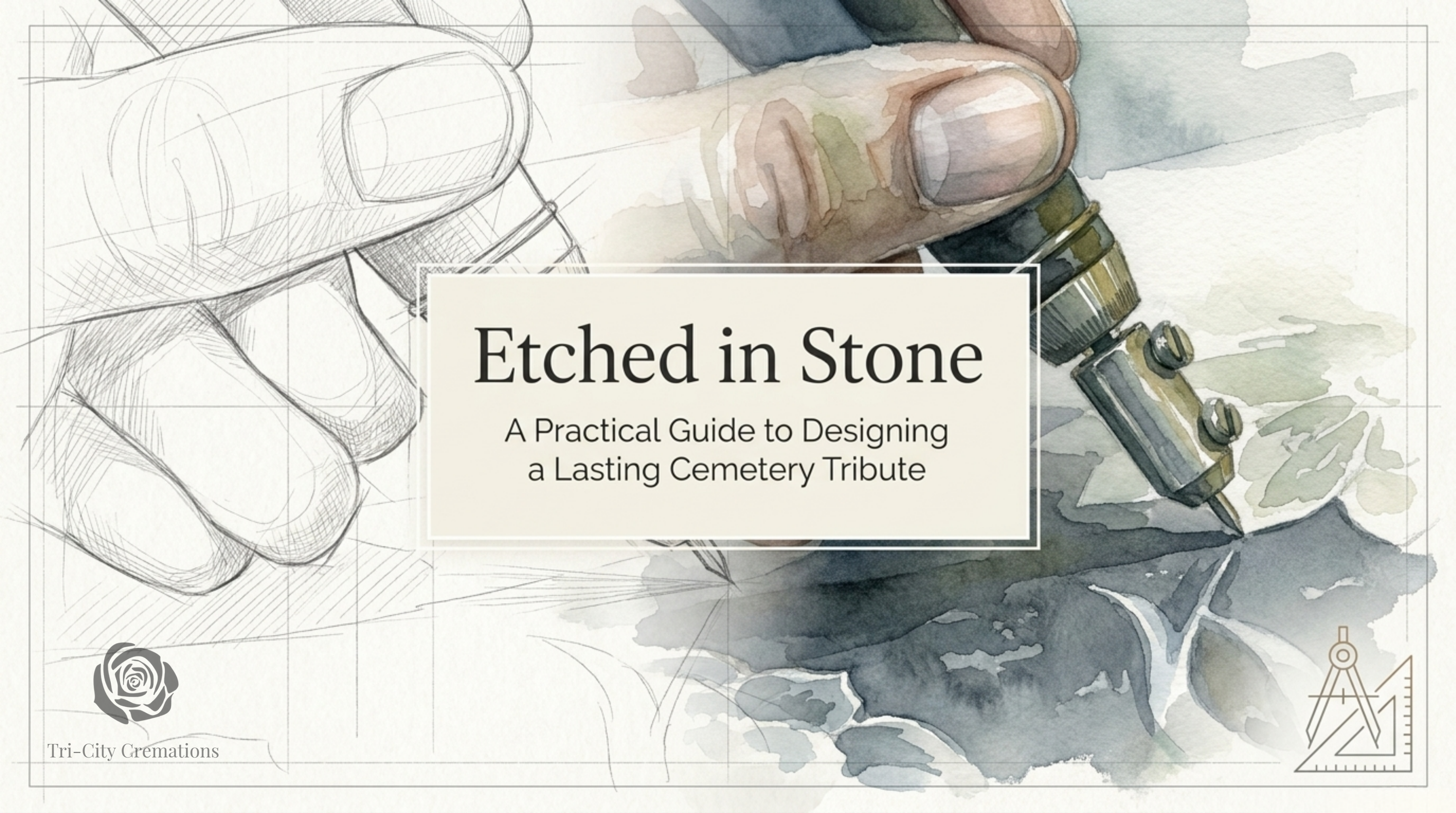

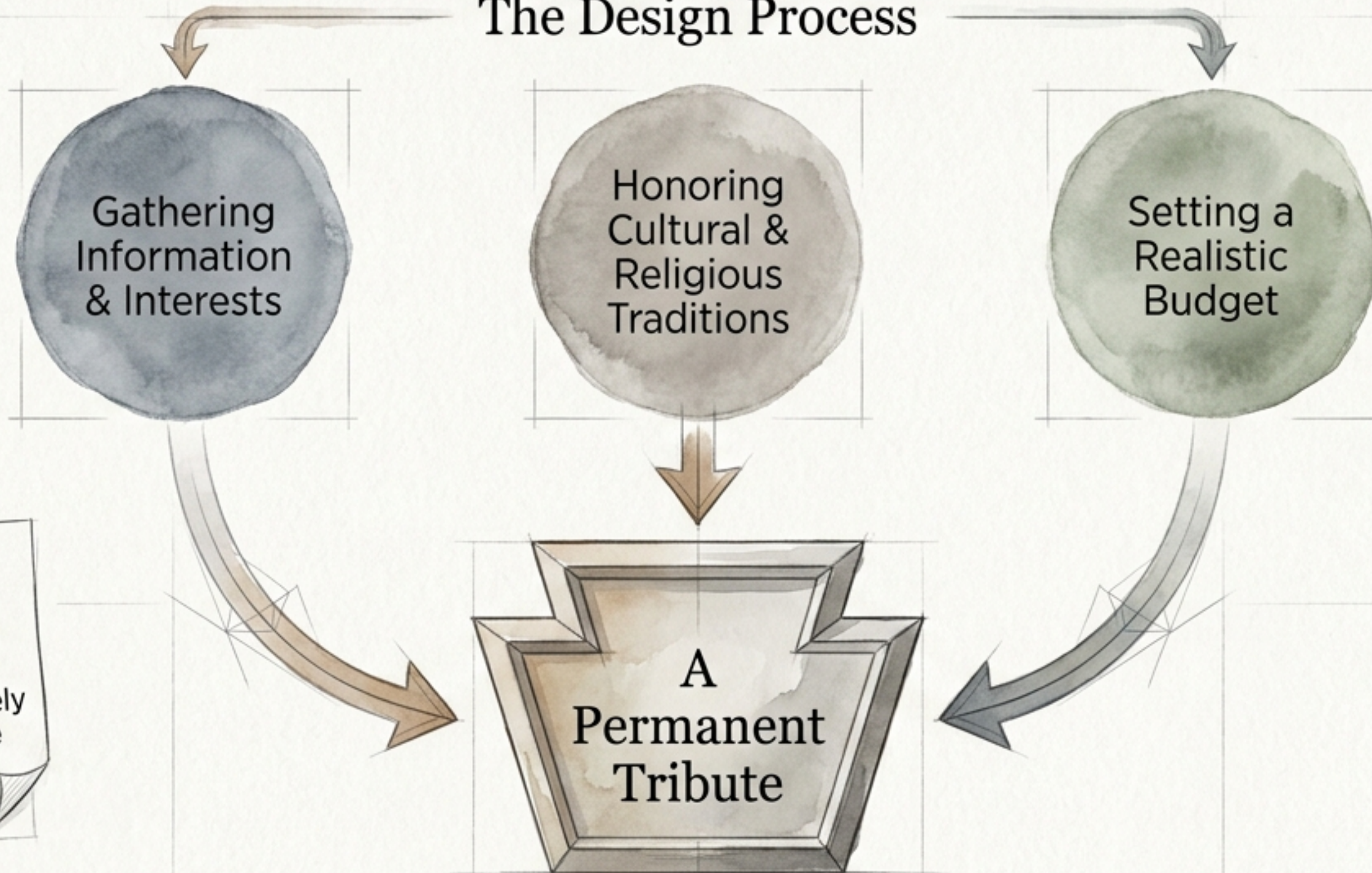

Involve the whole family early to create a meaningful tribute.

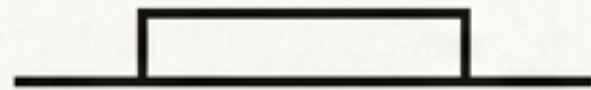

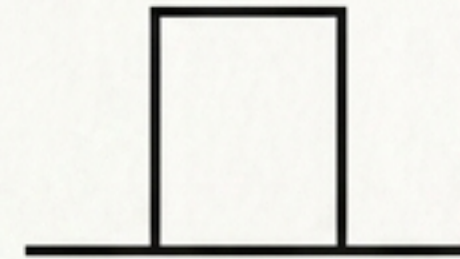
The Foundation: Understanding the Basics

Markers



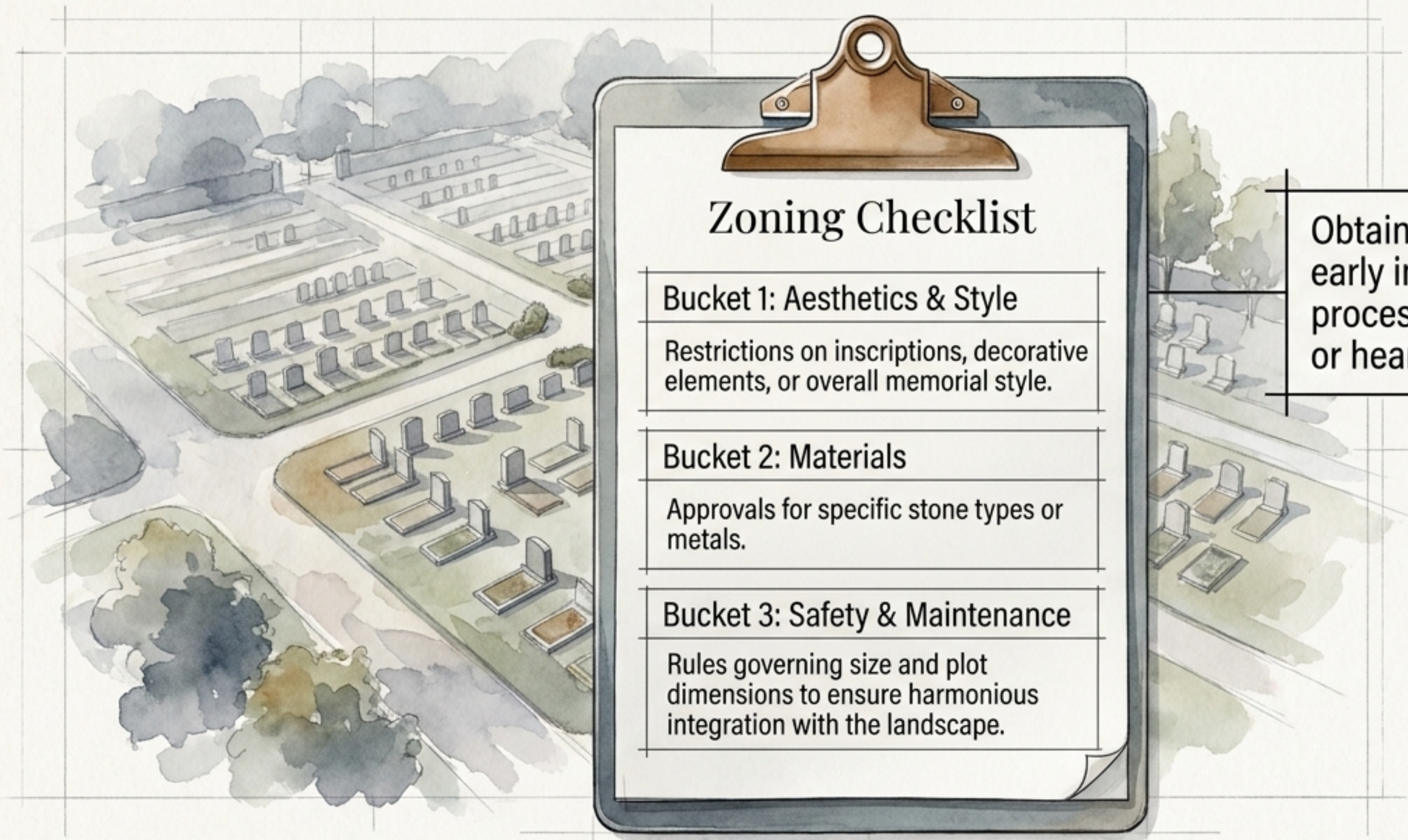
Smaller and simpler. Flat rectangular stone lying on the ground. Includes basic name, dates, and brief inscription.

Monuments



Traditional vertical headstones. Larger, prominent, with more room for customization, sculptures, or statues.

Zoning Checklist

Bucket 1: Aesthetics & Style

Restrictions on inscriptions, decorative elements, or overall memorial style.

Bucket 2: Materials

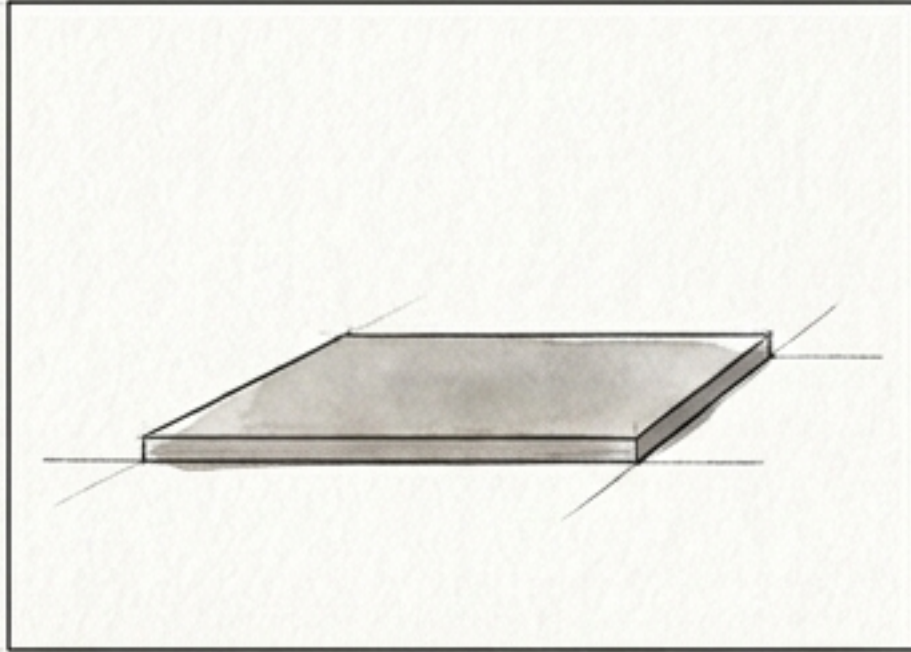
Approvals for specific stone types or metals.

Bucket 3: Safety & Maintenance

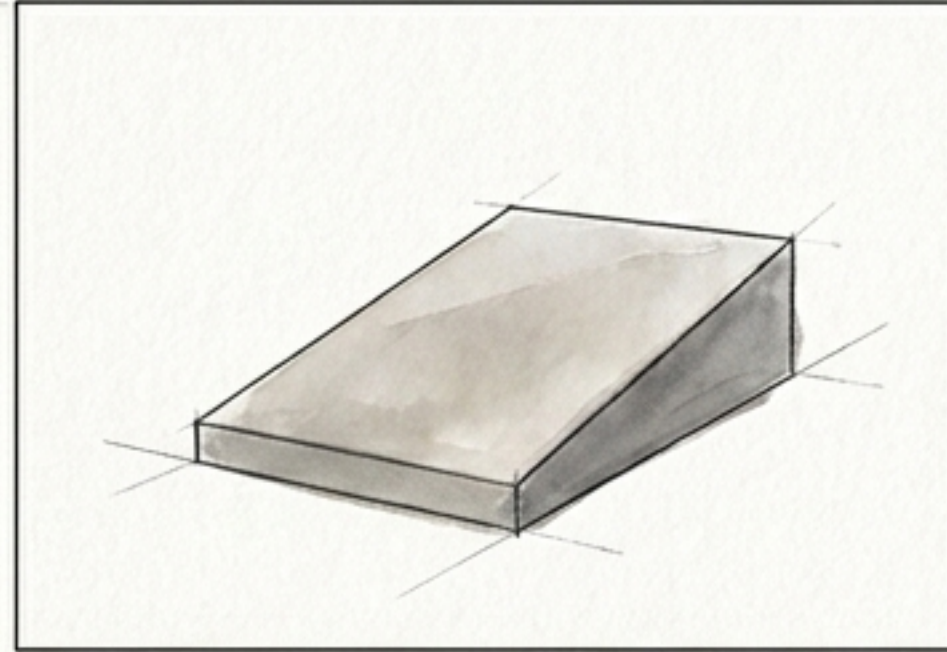
Rules governing size and plot dimensions to ensure harmonious integration with the landscape.

Obtain these guidelines early in the design process to avoid delays or heartbreak.

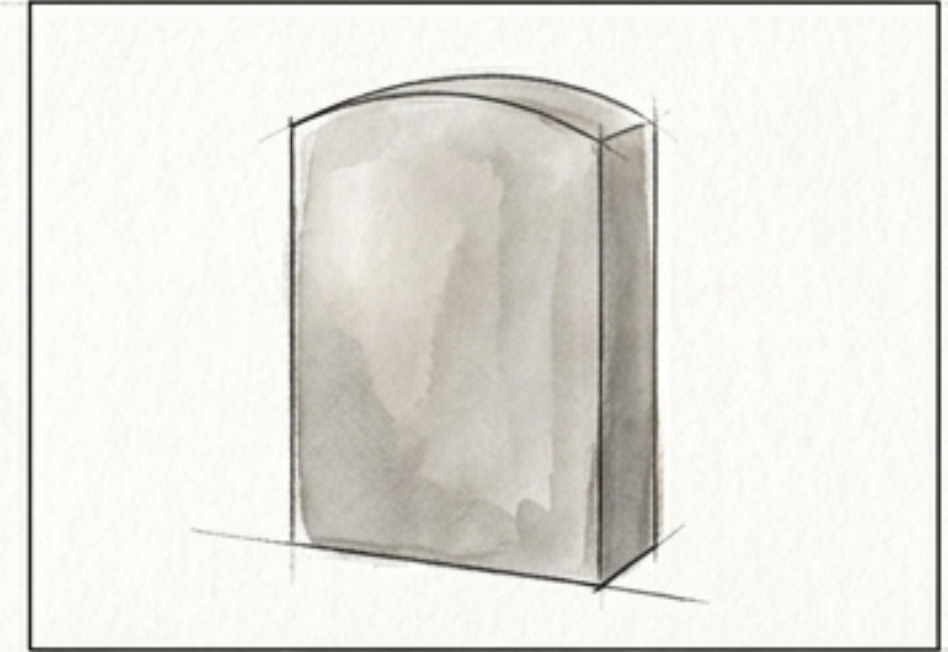

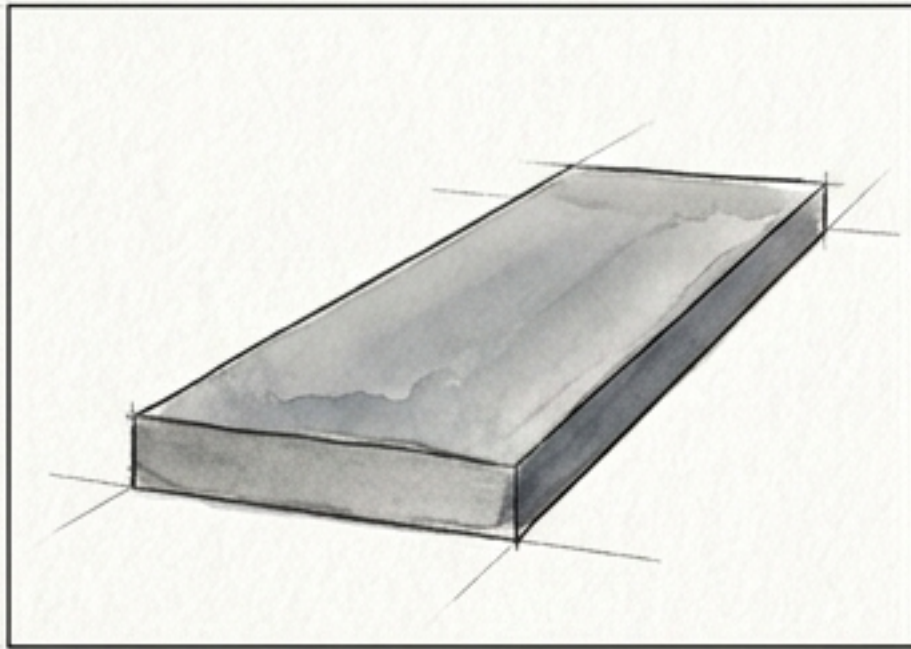
Lawn Level Marker



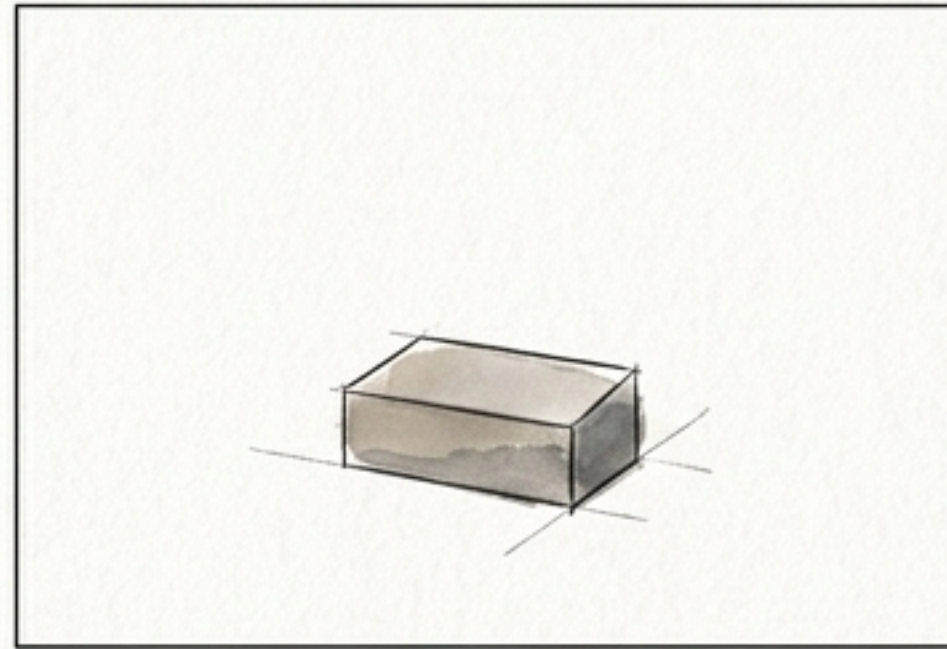
Slant / Bevel Marker



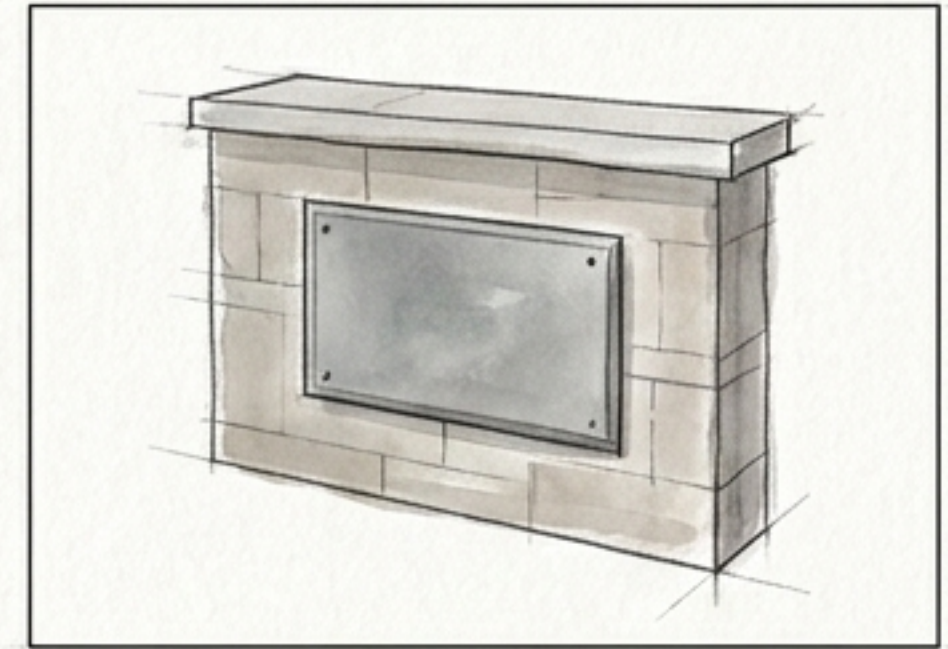
Upright Headstone

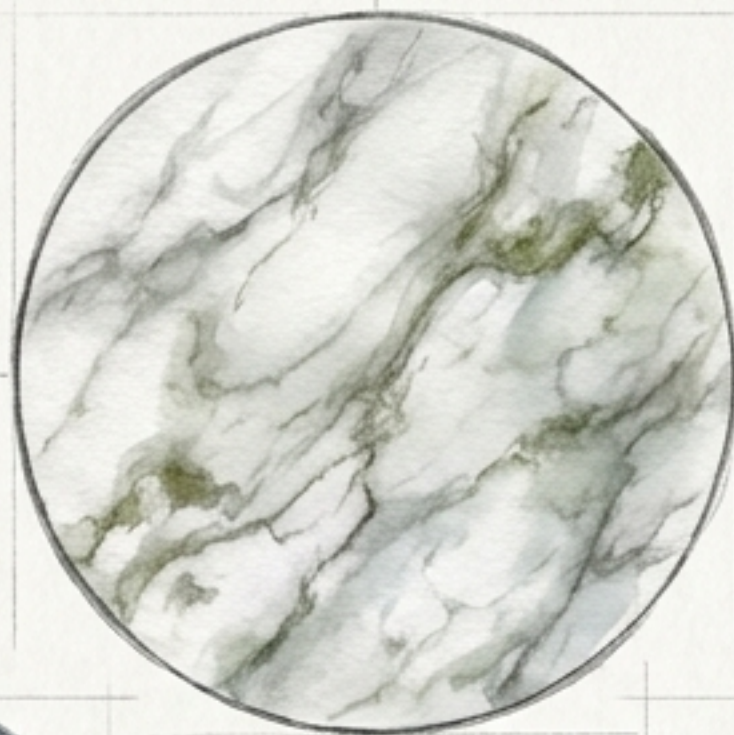

The Canvas of Time: Material Selection



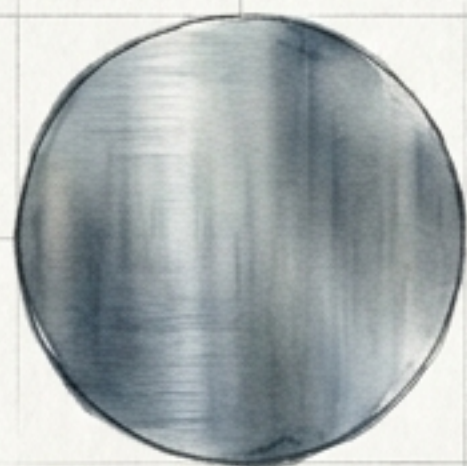
Granite

Material Durability Scale

Granite: Highly durable, excellent weathering properties.

Marble: Classic aesthetic, distinct weathering profile over decades.

Bronze: Elegant, requires specific upkeep.

MAINTENANCE AWARENESS:

Consider the long-term preservation of the monument. Ask about appropriate cleaning techniques to preserve the memorial's beauty and longevity, and consider eco-conscious design choices.

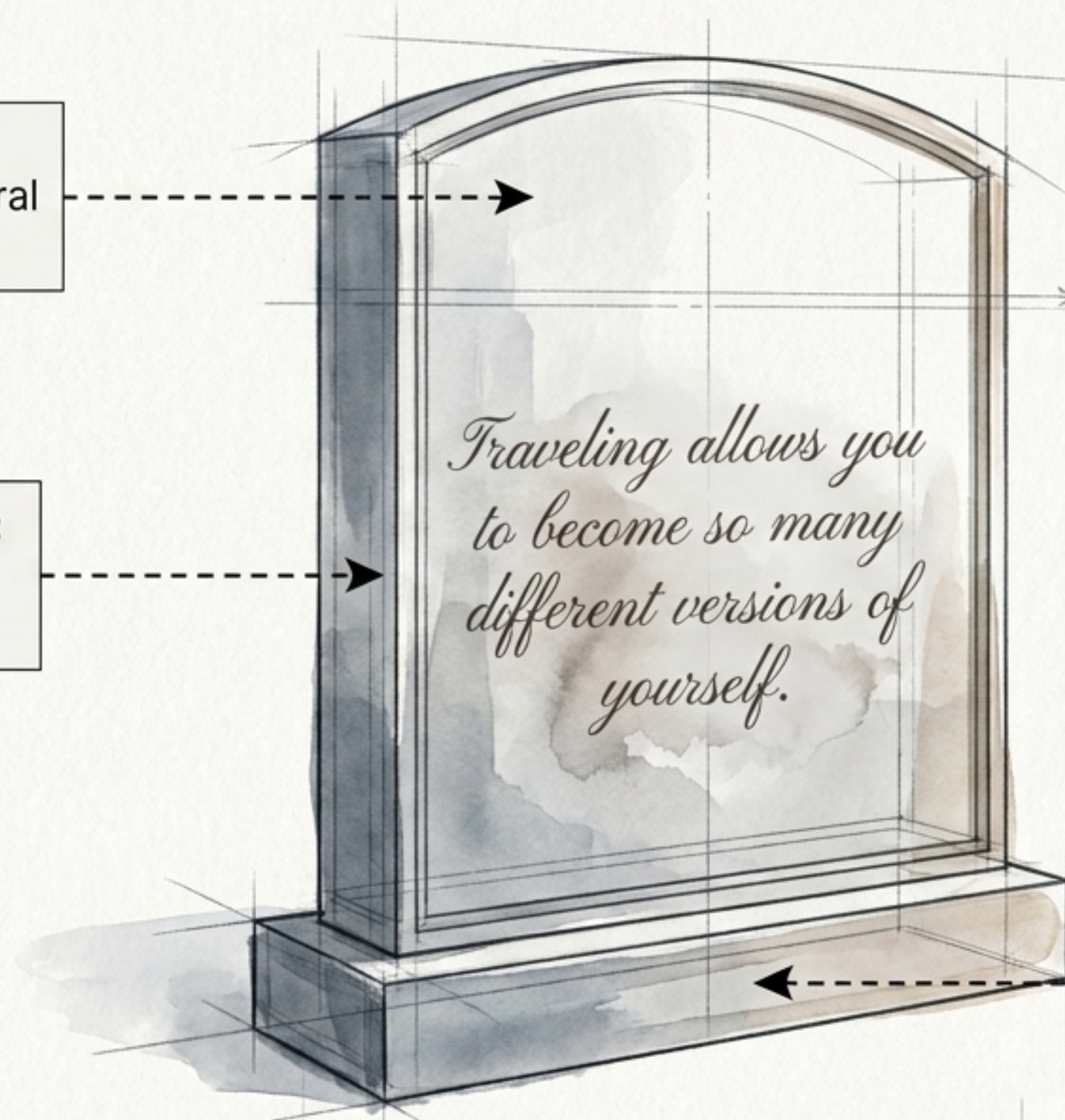
The Facade: Designing The Dash

Inscription & Lettering:

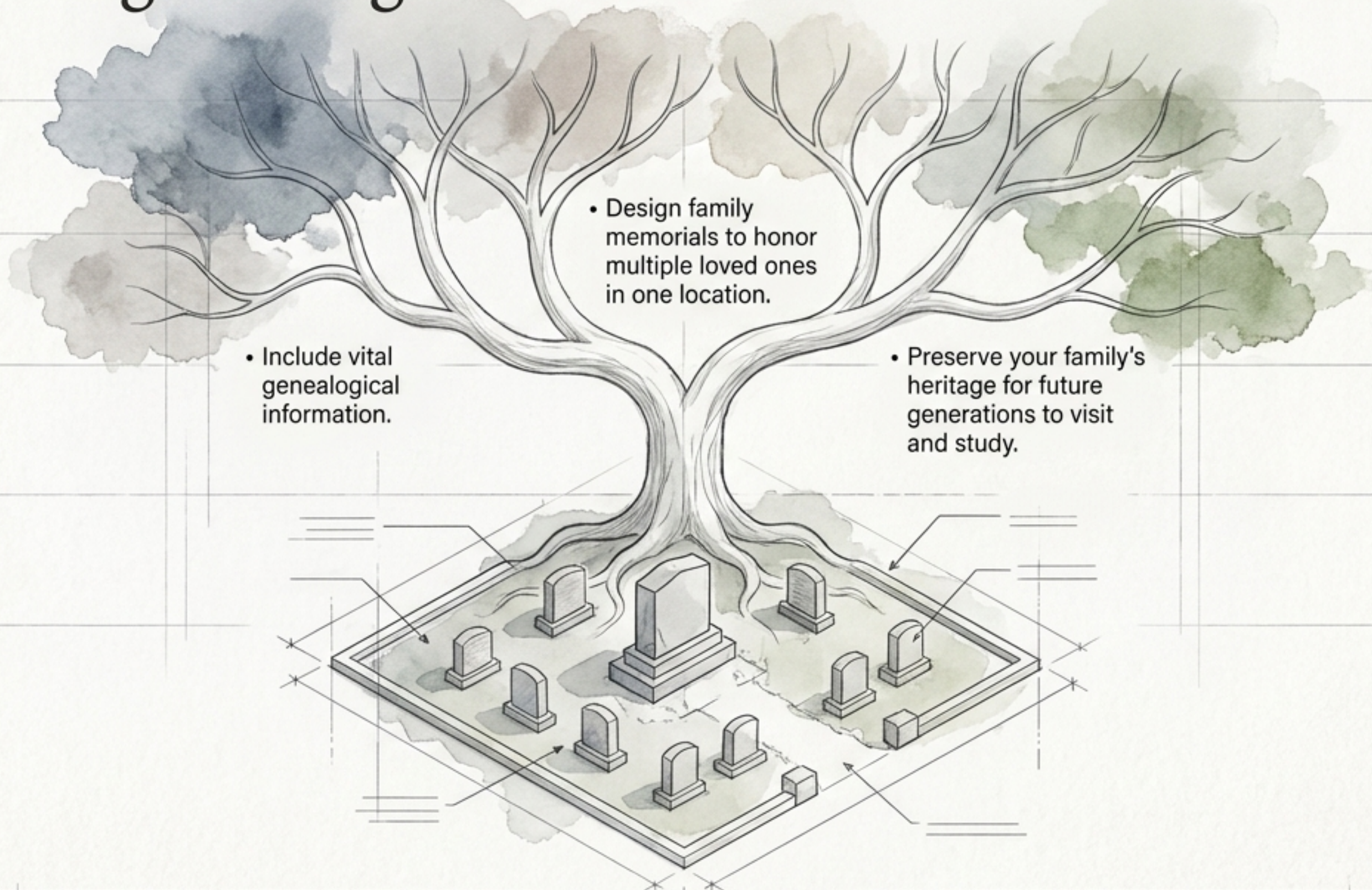
Carefully chosen fonts, name, dates.



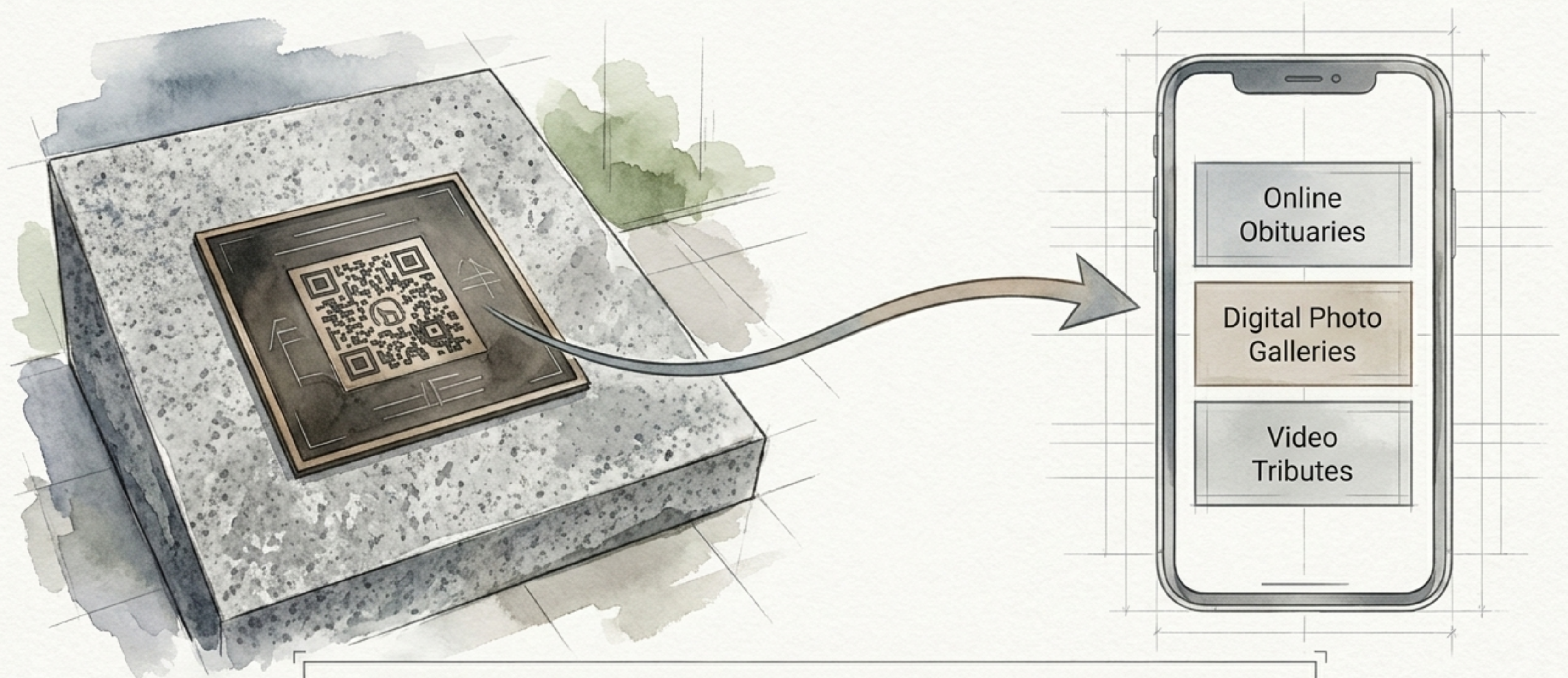
Customization:

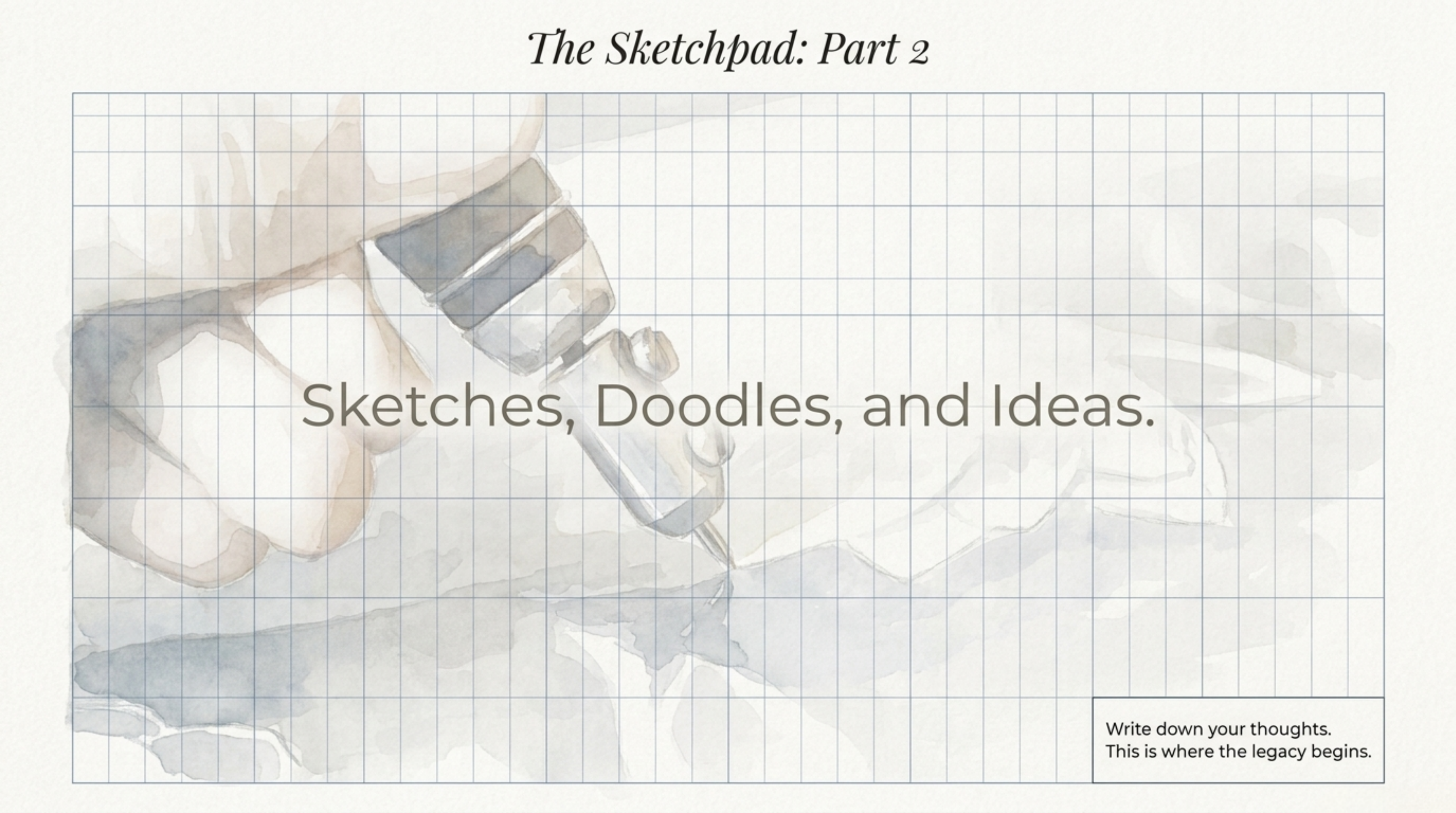

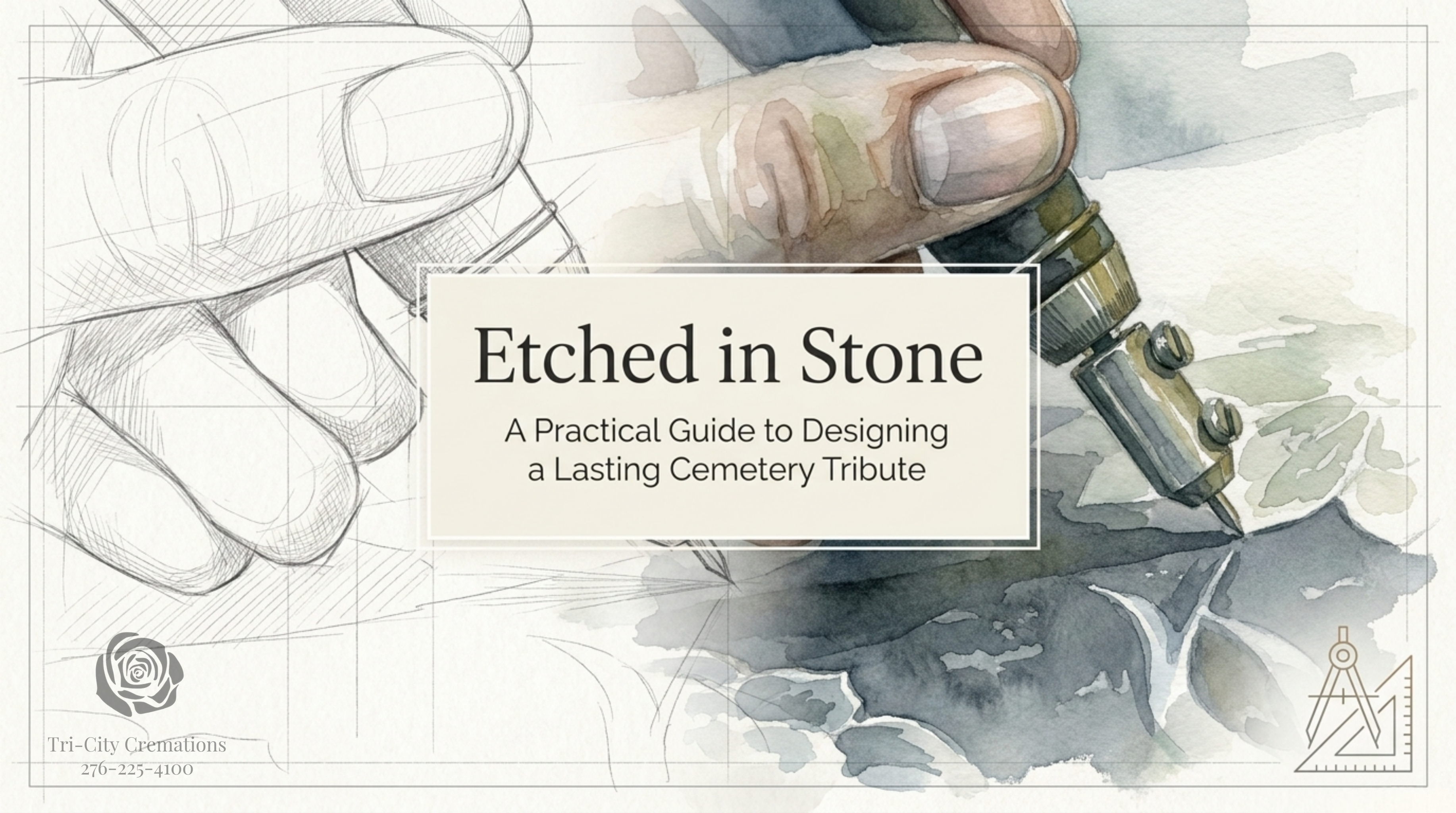
